HERE is a project that examines the complex and interrelated issues of immigration, migration, family trees, and family legacy. The tracing of one's ancestors is one of the oldest forms of mapping known to humankind.

Immigrants, those who came on their own and those who were forced to come to this country, have been and are still key to the United States' economic growth and expansion. This is an important fact that has been lost in the current U.S. debate on immigration reform. This project also investigates *"history with a small h"* or personal history and its relationship to what is considered *"History with a capital H."* It is often said that *"History"* is an agreed upon set of fabrications, while *"history"* is comprised of the stories shared among the generations.

This work is about and is dedicated to my late grandfather, John Adam Michal, who never met his grandchildren. He was born John Adam Michalski on October 18, 1906 somewhere in Poland. He came to the U.S. via Ellis Island in 1911 with his mother, stepfather and his brother. His family ended up in the Boston area. By all accounts he had a rough childhood. He lied about his age to enroll in the Marines and finished high school while in the service. He also changed his name from Michalski to Michal due to the discrimination against immigrants and Catholics. He left the Marines to care for his sick mother and after she passed, he took care of his half sisters. He was a longshoreman and pretty good carpenter. He married my grandmother - Mary Solar- the girl next store- who he had "his eye on" for quite sometime. They married much later than the norm at that time (in their 30's) due to my grandmother's father forbidding her to marry (and to also cut her hair). She was the youngest daughter in her family and was "needed" to live at home to care for her babcia (grandmother). John believed in reading and made sure there were dictionaries, encyclopedias, and books in the house for his one daughter. He also forbade hitting as a means of discipline. He was a gentle giant and a man of few words. He died in Boston on October 31st, 1963.

I am visiting some of the places he was connected to and leaving something behind for someone else to find. These performative actions will take place from October 18th through October 31st, 2014.
